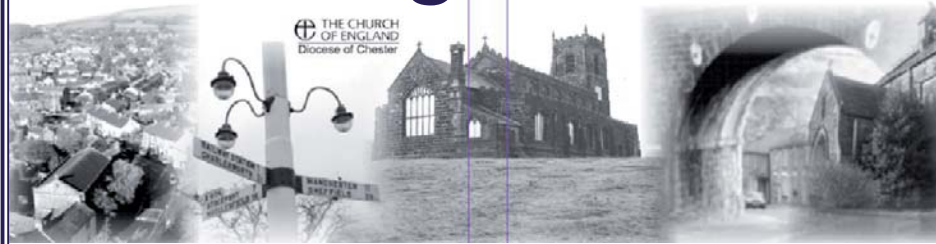

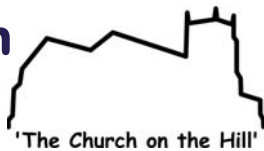

Whilst I was with you...

Tucked away in a tiny book toward the end of the Bible is the third letter of John.

It's a letter to John's dear friend Gaius encouraging his church to welcome the stranger who comes among them for the sake of Jesus, "to work with them as companions in proclaiming the truth". John has "no greater joy than to hear that the church are walking in the truth" and that they are "faithful in all they are doing for these brothers, showing them hospitality" and then "sending them on their way in a manner worthy of God."

I feel these sentiments could well have been written to Mottram Parish Church for the duration of my nearly three years as a brother in Christ in this place.

As I prepare to leave on the 5th March I've been reflecting on all the hospitality I've been shown and how we have indeed worked hard together for the truth.

From the outset I was offered the hospitality which comes not just from a cuppa and a cookie (nice though they are!) but the hospitality of sharing each other's lives, opening up about both joys and struggles. Walking with families in the parish and beyond, offering pastoral care and accompaniment has been a profound privilege, most especially at times of bereavement.

In return I have been frequently blessed by the support of our congregations through their constant prayer, encouragement,

wise and discerning words, and engagement with varied projects and forms of worship we have tried over the years... from stones to lolly sticks, from horses and riders to brass bands, from hallowed formality to chaotic frivolity and everything in between!

We have truly walked together as companions of the truth making the gospel more visible.

Some of the highlights for me have been: opening the Bible with children and seeing faith deepened in our youth group, schools, All Together Worship services and Easter Holiday Club; in the study, crafting and delivery of myriad sermons; in leading sacramental worship - through Holy Communion, encouraging prayer, and with families in marriage and baptism. And spending time with those on the fringes of the church and indeed society: at a local project for the homeless and overseas in Romania where the gospel impacts in remarkable ways.

So I trust you will now "send me on my way in a manner worthy of God" as I depart for St Mary's Partington & Carrington - with your blessing, with prayer and with encouragement to continue to walk in the truth with new companions. It just remains for me to say a huge **thank you** to everyone who has made my curacy here such a formative, enjoyable and enabling time in my life and ministry.

What is the church and how are we supposed to function?...

February 20th this year marked exactly 5 years since my induction as Vicar of Mottram.

When we arrived, our youngest daughter was only 6 months old, and now she's already half way through her second year in school – just one of many reminders about how quickly the time has past.

I've also been looking back through my diary – the number of things we've done together is quite astonishing.

We're currently hosting our third book group, although there were several other courses run in our house as well as groups in other people's homes. Plus a series of 'seminars' at the Magdalene Centre.

Two confirmation services. An untold number of different forms of youth group. The beginnings of Open the Book (now in its 5th year, having accumulated an annual Christmas Party and about to embark on its 2nd holiday club). 47 weddings and 142 funerals (taken by me personally – those numbers don't include services conducted by other clergy).

A new pastoral team. 1 epic Real Lives mission week. 30 PCC meetings. 1 Curate. 9 new staff employed and 8 new governors appointed to our two church schools, upholding the Church's historic commitment to education. 2 whole church family weekends away.

And that's just for starters, quite obviously the list goes on and on...

All of which has got me to thinking: *Just what is the church and how are we supposed to function?*

It's not uncommon for my diary (just as will also be true for some of you) to be 'too full'. 5 years in, this might be an opportunity to re-focus and identify the key ministries and tasks which should be top priority. But doing that requires an answer to the same question: *What is the church and how are we supposed to function?*

So, I'd love to encourage you to commit to being with us as much as possible on Sundays in March, in particular.

The first Sunday in March is our opportunity to say goodbye to Andrew, but after that I shall be preaching on particular Bible passages which respond to that question. I'm praying this March will be an opportunity for all of us (whether we've been here 5 weeks, 5 years or 75 years!) to pause and ask: *What is the Church? Why are we here? How are we supposed to function?*

Will you pray with me that God would use this season to speak to us afresh of his purposes for us?

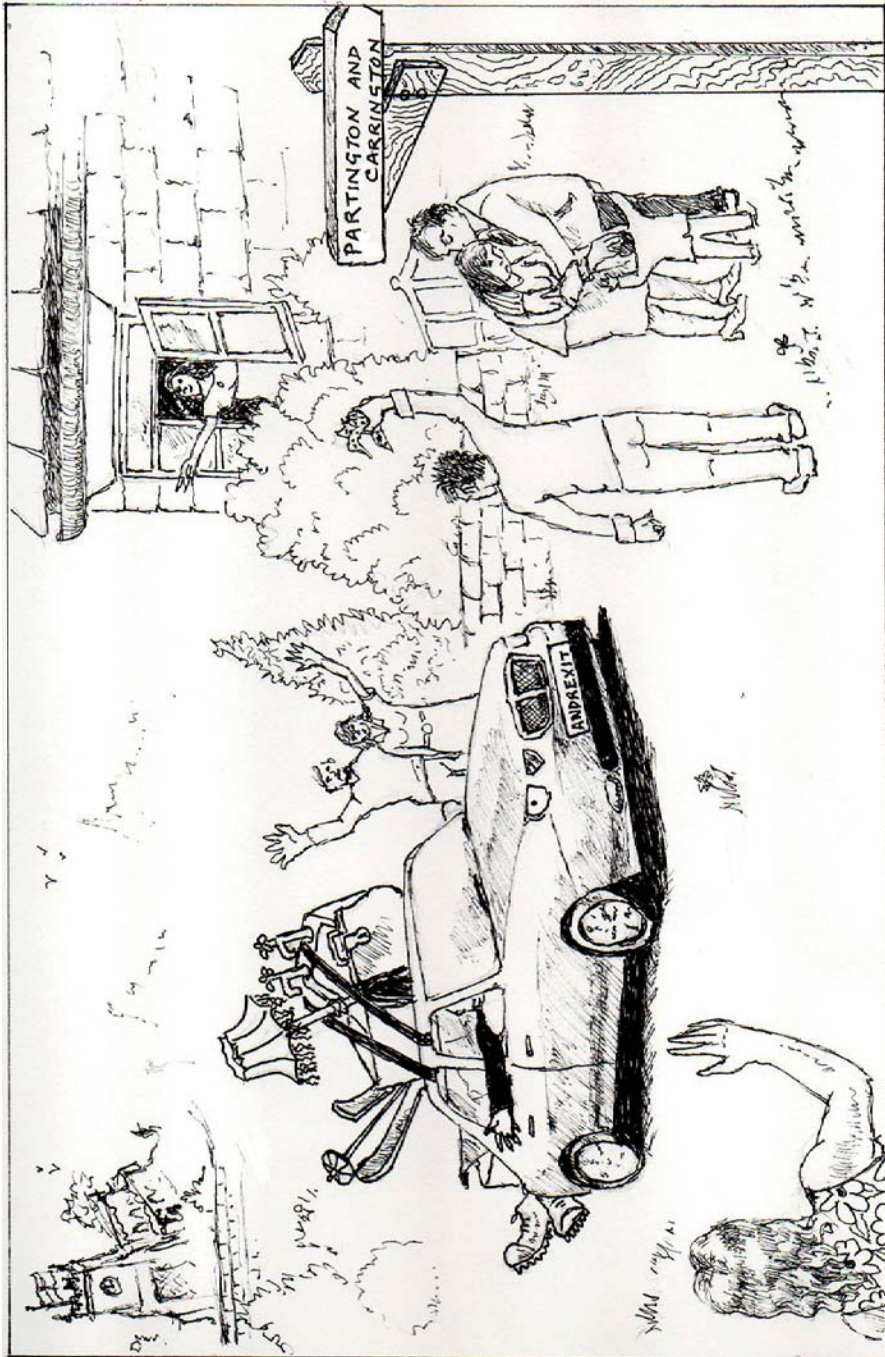

Lent, and true Self-denial

Canon David Winter looks at what self-denial really means...

The whole of this month is Lent – bad news for smokers desperately waiting for Easter so that they can get at the fags again; but for those who take self-discipline seriously, it's a reminder that Christianity isn't a short-term option. Among the harder sayings of Jesus was this one: 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me'.

The phrase 'deny themselves' is the challenge of Lent, and the origin of the idea that for those six weeks we 'give up' something.

Once upon a time it was meat; nowadays it's more often something that we know is damaging to our health or well-being. Neither option really meets the demands of 'self-denial'.

Jesus was certainly not thinking of dieting or giving up luxuries. For one thing He and His followers were known to enjoy their food and drink (and were criticised for it!). They knew about fasting as a religious discipline, because at specified times it was part of their Jewish faith – a discipline, but not 'self-denial'.

For Jesus, self-denial is a total mental attitude. It's not self-loathing or seeing ourselves as valueless. We are made in God's image and of infinite value to Him.

Jesus demonstrated true self-denial in the Garden of Gethsemane, when He simply prayed 'Not my will, but yours, be done'. 'Me first', 'looking after Number One', is self-indulgence. Self-denial is its precise opposite.

Oddly enough, putting God's will before our own seems to make for happiness, not misery – even in Lent.

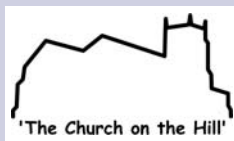

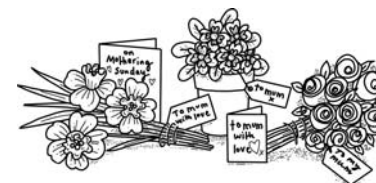

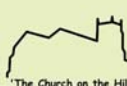
