

The steadfast love of the LORD never ceases...

These past few weeks have been particularly tough, haven't they? As I write, we're still waiting for Summer to blossom, a long election campaign is over (or is it?) and a series of catastrophes – from terrorist atrocities to the terrible fire in London – have filled our TV screens and newspapers. In the midst of that it can sometimes be hard to speak positively about having faith in God.

The thought of my affliction and my homelessness is wormwood and gall! My soul continually thinks of it and is bowed down within me. But this I call to mind, and therefore I have hope:

The steadfast love of the LORD never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness.

"The LORD is my portion," says my soul, "therefore I will hope in him." The LORD is good to those who wait for him, to the soul that seeks him.

(Lamentations 3:19-25)

Here's a Bible reading in the midst of terrible devastation, total loss and apparent abandonment. Yet here is also one of the most striking statements of faith in all Scripture. Here, even here – with the bitterest taste of life in the mouth – "The steadfast love of the LORD never ceases, his mercies never come to an end..."

Just because we struggle to have faith

in (keep faith with) Him – that never stops him being faithful towards us. His steadfast love never ceases.

So what does it mean to have faith in God? It means to trust that, whatever the situation, he remains faithful to us. He still steadfastly loves us. His mercies toward us are new every morning. So who knows what the next new morning will bring?

And right here is the heart of what the Bible has to say about worship and faith and discipleship and spirituality and christian growth: that it's not about us, it's about God. If we look first at ourselves and the world around us, we'll become absorbed by and obsessed with our circumstances, forgetting that God has anything to say or do or feel about anything we experience.

But if we turn our eyes away from ourselves and our circumstances, turn them instead towards God – then we'll see one who constantly loves, is constantly merciful, constantly faithful.

Whatever causes us to struggle in our faithfulness (or faith-full-ness) towards him, he never stops loving us (Paul says the same thing in 2 Timothy 2:13: if we are faithless, he remains faithful). The kind of faith we are called to have is the faith to believe that God is constant where we aren't. And so to wait for his answers, wherever ours seem to fail.

He is what we never are – having faith is simply recognising that remarkable truth.

For the air is clear tonight.


The sun sinks further o'er the hill,

Wordsearch: St. Swithun - saint for a rainy day

St. Swithun (or Swithun) is the saint you can blame for rainy summers. It is said that if it rains on his special day, 15th July, it will then rain for 40 days after that. Swithun became Bishop of Winchester in 852, under King Ethelwulf of Wessex, in the days when Wessex was the most important kingdom of England. Swithun was famous for his charitable gifts and for his energy in getting churches built. When he was dying in 862, all he asked was that he be buried in the cemetery of the Old Minster, just outside the west door. But on 15th July 971, the monks decided to move Swithun into their newly built cathedral. And so his bones were dug up. The unusually heavy rain that day, and on the days following, was attributed to the power of St Swithun. Swithun was disturbed again in 1093, when he was moved into the new Winchester cathedral. So if it rains on 15th July....get out your umbrella!



Not much of a doubter, really...

Canon David Winter recalls the dedication of Thomas


It's a strange nickname for a man whose burning faith in Jesus took him, so some accounts say, all the way to India to found a Christian Church there (Mar Thoma). But 'Doubting Thomas' he is, and in one way it's good to have someone in the early band of disciples who represents all those of us who tend to find unquestioning faith difficult.

His tendency to ask the searching, even perhaps sarcastic question, can be found in the Gospel (see John 14:6), but his reputation was set for ever on the first Easter night. Thomas was not in the Upper Room when the risen Jesus appeared for the first time to the apostles, and when they told him what had happened he was unimpressed. "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my fingers in his wounds I will not believe."

A week later Jesus appeared again, and this time not only was Thomas there, but Jesus singled him out for special attention. "Come on," he said, "here are the wounds. Do not doubt, but believe." That was the end of the Doubter, who fell to his knees to exclaim, "My Lord and my God!"

Jesus observed that he had seen and believed. There would be many in the future, He said, who would not have such evidence set before them, but yet would believe. Among them, I like to think, are many Thomases, people for

whom faith (in the sense of believing propositions) is seldom easy. I suspect Thomas's favourite saying of Jesus was "Seek and you will find." It's not a bad one to have in mind this year on St Thomas's Day, 3rd July.


