

SEA SUNDAY

Over many years the 2nd Sunday of July has been kept as Sea Sunday, with a special focus on prayer for all seafarers. The Mission to Seafarers supports the work of sailors facing difficult waters, piracy, and separation from loved ones for long periods at sea. However, we can also experience storms in our own lives.

In Acts 27 we read how Paul was being taken as a prisoner to Rome, when he was caught in a storm off Crete. After 14 days they were shipwrecked on the island of Malta. Paul had warned the crew that it wasn't a safe time of year to sail: "*I can see that our voyage is going to be disastrous and bring great loss to ship and cargo, and to our own lives.*" But his words were ignored, and the ship sailed into a violent storm.

By the third day they 'finally gave up all hope of being saved'. How do we face up to storms in our lives? Do we worry and panic? God doesn't necessarily prevent storms from taking place, but we can trust His purpose through them.

Paul urged the sailors to "keep courage, because not one of you will be lost, only the ship will be destroyed". His confidence rested on an angelic promise: "Do not be afraid, Paul. You must stand trial before Caesar; and God has graciously given you the lives of all who sail with you." Only the sovereign God, who created the wind and waves, can promise to save people from a storm. What does this mean for us in our circumstances today?

'Through many dangers, toils and snares I have already come. Grace has brought me safe thus far, and grace will lead me home.' (Amazing Grace: John Newton).





NOTICE - OPEN DOORS MAGAZINE



The last time Khada* saw her husband was an ordinary day – or as ordinary as any day can be in Afghanistan since the Taliban takeover in 2021. Afghan citizens face daily restrictions, oppression and danger, and nobody more so than people like Khada and her husband, Ehsan*: Afghanistan's underground Christians. On that 'ordinary' day, their worst fears came true. Ehsan disappeared.

Christians in Afghanistan have to make sure their faith isn't discovered by the wrong people – but the church in the country is growing. They are part of a silent, worldwide group who don't know each other's names and may never see each other's faces: the secret church.

Khada was born into a deeply religious Muslim family. She expected to follow the same

path as her mother: marry the Muslim man chosen by her parents and raise a devout Muslim family herself.

Sure enough, Khada married Ehsan, as arranged by their families. She moved in with her in-laws, and the union was very happy. "Our relations at home were very good," she remembers "and my husband loved me immensely."

It was relatively common, then, for Afghan women to have jobs – Khada worked in an office and was close with her boss. "We became friends" Khada says. "I shared the stories of my life, and she shared her stories ."


One day, Khada's boss made an extraordinarily brave decision. She gave Khada a Bible.

In Afghanistan, even before the Taliban takeover, it was extremely risky to give a Muslim a Bible. It is illegal to convert from Islam and very dangerous to share your faith – Khada's Christian boss took a huge risk in giving her the Word of God.

When Khada got home, she showed the Bible to Ehsan. They both knew the Quran thoroughly but didn't know what was in the Bible, and were curious to find out. Over the next six months, they read through it all – and were amazed at what they found...



We are eagerly looking forward to working with the Revd. Adele to further God's work in our Community.


Churches Count on Nature

is an annual scheme where people visit churchyards and record the plant and animal species they encounter. The biodiversity survey is supported by environmental charities A Rocha UK and Caring for God's Acre, and by

The Church of England and The Church in Wales. Churches have shared how learning about the wildlife found in their churchyards changed how they think about their space and would manage it going forward. (Lissy Steen of A Rocha UK - caring for God's Earth)

The churchyard mowing team are hoping to contribute to the count next year and so far have recorded 44 wild flowers (inc. grasses and trees), 3 ferns, 3 birds and 2 mammals, but there must be more. There will be some lists at the back of church (soon) and any additions that people can make will be very welcome.

Safeguarding and Mottram Church

What is Safeguarding?

Safeguarding is about: **P**reventing abuse **P**rotecting those who are being abused and **P**romoting flourishing and emotional wellbeing.



Why is the church concerned with safeguarding?

The church has realised that there have been and are individuals within the Church of England who have used their position of trust to abuse children, young people and adults. Mottram Parish is committed to ensuring that this does not happen here, through good processes when we are employing volunteers and workers; awareness-raising, vigilance and training; and systematic review of what is happening within our church.

How does the church keep people safe?

Every Parochial Church Council (PCC) is responsible for developing and maintaining a Safeguarding Policy, which provides guidance to all who work with others within the church. Mottram's policy was last updated in 2023 – you can find a copy of the policy here: mottramparish.org.uk/joinin/ safeguarding/

Mottram PCC has also appointed a Safeguarding Lead, Claire Bibby. Claire's contact details are on the parish website: mottramparish.org.uk

What does a Safeguarding Lead do?

The Safeguarding Lead assists the PCC in making sure that safeguarding systems, practices and records are up-to-date. This includes ensuring that the policy is updated regularly, making sure that volunteers and other workers who work with children and adults who might be vulnerable are recruited safely with police checks from the Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS checks) where that is appropriate, making sure that volunteers and other workers are regularly trained in safeguarding, and promoting the understanding that safeguarding is everyone's business. It is also an important part of the job to make sure that everyone knows where to turn to if they have concerns about an individual. (*Continued overleaf*)

Are you interested in this work?

Mottram Church PCC has decided, in principle, that it would be a good idea to have an Assistant Safeguarding Lead. This work is supported by Chester Diocese through regular training and networks, led by the Diocesan Safeguarding Team. It is not an onerous job, but it needs regular input. The ideal person will have a heart for safeguarding and will be someone to whom other people can talk in confidence. You also need to be systematic and a good record-keeper. If you think you might like to help with this work, please contact Claire for an informal chat.

HIGH DAYS and HOLY DAYS

16th July - St Helier of Jersey

Take the book of Samuel in the Bible, add a bit of Luke Skywalker father/son conflict from Star Wars, stir in a dash of Pirates of the Caribbean, and you sort of have the story of St Helier – the first saint and martyr of Jersey.

According to legend, it all began in 6th century Tongeren (now in Belgium). A pagan couple badly wanted a child, but the wife was barren. In desperation they sought the help of a local Christian, Cunibert. He advised them to pray to the Christian God, and to promise that any child born would be 'given back' to God. So they did, and then the wife fell pregnant and gave birth to a son, Helier.

The parents were delighted – at first. But as the baby grew into a boy, it became clear that Helier was different from other children – he was precociously intelligent and could

perform miracles. Helier's father found this unsettling and grew jealous of Cunibert's influence over his son. Finally he plotted to have Cunibert murdered.

In horror at such treachery, Helier fled and wandered far away. He eventually reached a monastic community in Normandy, run by Saint Marculf. Here he settled, seeking a life of contemplation, but it was not to be. Marculf had received pleas for help from the tiny community of an island called Gersut, or Agna (now called Jersey). They, too, had had bitter experience of violent murderous men: Vikings, Saxons and Vandals had each raided the island in turn. Now they sought some comfort from the Christians: would someone bring them the Gospel?

Marculf could not ignore such a plea, and so he sent Helier and a companion, Romard, to Jersey. The two monks found a small community of fishermen on the sand dunes where the town of St Helier would later grow. Helier chose to settle on a tidal islet, nowadays known as the Hermitage Rock. Romard, would act as the 'go between' between Helier in his hermitage and the fishing village.

Helier had chosen a remote spot for peace and quiet as he approached God. But one day he discovered that his tidal islet had another great advantage. While looking out to sea and praying, he suddenly saw the sails of attacking pirates, stealthily approaching the island.

Frantically, Helier signalled the shore of danger coming, and the fishermen and their families scattered into the surrounding marshes, beyond the reach of the bloodthirsty pirates. This happened time and again, and became so well known in island history that even today, small dark clouds on the horizon are still known as *les vailes dé St. Hélyi* (the sails of St Helier).

One day the pirates finally caught up with Helier on his tidal islet. They beheaded him. Helier was deeply mourned, and has always been revered in Jersey for having brought Christianity to the island. The traditional year of his martyrdom is 555AD. His feast day is marked in Jersey by an annual municipal and ecumenical pilgrimage to the Hermitage, on 16th July.
